BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor, the Borough Administrator, the Borough Clerk, and the Borough Attorney are authorized to take all appropriate actions so as to implement this Resolution.

INTRODUCTION OF ORDINANCES

ORDINANCE 2022-69

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ARTICLE VII, CHAPTER 85-37, ZONING OF THE BOROUGH OF HO-HO-KUS. THE FOLLOWING SECTIONS ARE AMENDED.

WHEREAS, the Borough's policy is to maintain the established character and scale of the Borough and to regulations that are in character and scale with the established neighborhoods; and

WHEREAS, the borough seeks to establish sign regulations to promote the orderly arrangement of regulations and to promote a safe and efficient use of signs in the Borough to promote the goals and objectives of the Borough Master Plan.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus, in the County of Bergen and State of New Jersey, that Article VII Special Regulations section entitled §85-37 entitled "Signs" are hereby amended and supplementing the existing code in the following particulars only: (deleted sections are noted by strikethroughs, new sections are <u>underlined</u>)

<u>Section 1</u>. Amend section §85-37.004 Prohibited Sign and Sign Features item M., by amending the following particulars only:

M. No metal signs shall be permitted. Signs shall be constructed of wood or <u>carved wood</u> material, <u>not of metal except as specifically permitted herein.</u> Freestanding sign support posts may be constructed of metal or masonry composite designed and detailed to be complimentary to the theme of the sign design and building style.

Section 2. Amend section 85-37.005 General Sign Regulations, by amending the following particulars only:

H. (Add New Section) A coordinated graphics sign design theme throughout a building or property is encouraged. The design theme should include a consistent style and size of lettering, construction materials, colors, location, type of pole or standard, size and lighting as permitted herein. The color of letters and backgrounds should be coordinated in relation to the color of the material or buildings or where the signs are proposed to be located.

<u>Section 3.</u> Amend section §85-37.014 Signs Permitted for Business Related Uses (Multi-Tenanted Buildings or Industrial Parks), by amending the following particulars only:

\$85-37.014 (Amend to 37.015) Signs Permitted for Business Related Uses (Multi-Tenanted Buildings or Industrial Parks)

- C. (Amend to letter <u>A.</u>) Each such tenant or user shall submit a <u>tenant</u> signing plan to the Planning Board for approval.
- D. (Amend to letter <u>B.</u>) The signing plan shall be based on an integrated design theme to include all of the elements in §85-37.02. All of the above elements shall be designed to be in harmony and consistent with each other, the architecture and materials of the principal structures and the landscaping plan. The reviewing board, in its sole discretion, shall determine if a proposed signing plan meets the goals and objectives of this subsection.
- E. (Amend to letter <u>C.</u>) The total area of all signs inside or outside each main building on any one property shall not exceed two square feet per foot of building frontage or 60 square feet, whichever is the smaller, and the lesser dimension of any sign shall not exceed two feet.
- F. (Amend to letter <u>D.</u>) No such tenant sign mounted to the building shall be higher than 20 feet as measured from the average façade elevation. If such tenant sign is freestanding it shall be no higher than 6 feet.
- E. (Add New Section) A building wall mounted and/or a freestanding tenant directory ground sign is permitted for a multi-tenanted or multi-use building as permitted herein. A freestanding tenant directory sign is permitted only

where a principal building is setback a minimum of 40 feet from a street R.O.W. providing access to said property, otherwise a directory sign shall **only** be attached to the principal building. Such tenant directory sign background shall be constructed of wood except, the individual tenant plaques may be composed of a non-wood, plastic or metal material. A tenant directory sign in the IP Industrial Park zones may be constructed of metal, wood or wood simulated composite material. The tenant sign shall be permitted to identify the name of the building in addition to the businesses on the premises. The directory sign shall have a maximum sign area of 25 square feet and a maximum height of 6 feet from grade at the base of the sign and a width of no greater than 8 feet. Freestanding tenant directory signs shall have a minimum setback of five feet from a street line or right-of-way line and 5 feet from a property line.

Section 4. Amend section §85-37.015 Signs Permitted for Service Station Uses, by amending the following particulars only:

§85-37.015 (Amend to 37.016) Signs Permitted for Service Station Uses

Section 5. Amend section §85-37.009 Nonconforming Signs item B., by amending the following particulars only:

B. A sign existing on the effective date of the adoption of this section which does not conform to any provision thereof, shall be deemed a nonconforming use and may be continued, maintained and repaired upon its present premises, provided that such sign was lawful under any prior ordinance. Any legal nonconforming sign on any premises involving a change in tenancy of said premises or involving a change in the physical appearance of the sign shall revoke the nonconforming rights as soon as the physical appearance of the sign is changed in any manner whatsoever. Nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the normal maintenance of a legal nonconforming sign, such as bulb replacement, painting or replacement of existing lettering.

<u>Section 6.</u> If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence or any other part of this ordinance is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this ordinance.

<u>Section 7</u>. All ordinances or parts of ordinances which are inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

Section 8. The Borough Clerk is hereby directed to give notice at least ten (10) days prior to the hearing on the adoption of this ordinance to the Bergen County Planning Board, and to all others entitled thereto pursuant to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40:55D-15. Upon adoption of this ordinance, after public hearing thereon, the Borough clerk is further directed to publish notice of the passage thereof and to file copy of this ordinance as finally adopted with the Bergen County Planning Board as required by N.J.S.A. 40:55D-16 and with the Borough Tax Assessor.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after final passage and publication as prescribed by law.

ORDINANCE 2022-70

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING THE BOROUGH OF HO-HO-KUS TO EXECUTE A FINANCIAL AGREEMENT WITH LMF HHK URBAN RENEWAL LLC

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 20-38 pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-6, the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus directed the Planning Board of the Borough Ho-Ho-Kus (the "Planning Board"), to undertake a preliminary investigation to determine whether the area in the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus, known and designated as Block 1016, Lots 3, 5 and 11, inclusive of any and all streets, and right of ways, as shown on the Official Tax Map of the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus, commonly known as 619 North Maple Avenue, 217 First Street and 239 First Street, (the "Redevelopment Area"), meets the criteria of an area in need of redevelopment set forth in N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-5, without the use of eminent domain in accordance with Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-1 et seq. (the "Redevelopment Law"); and

WHEREAS, the Planning Board authorized Edward Snieckus, Jr., PP, LLA, ASLA, of Burgis Associates, Inc. (the "Planner"), to review the designation criteria and prepare a report to the Planning Board as to whether the Redevelopment Area meets the criteria of a non-condemnation redevelopment area, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-1, et seq.; and

WHEREAS, after reviewing the preliminary investigative report entitled "619 N. Maple Avenue, 217 First Street and 239 First Street, Area in Need of Redevelopment Study-Non-condemnation" dated May 5, 2020" prepared by the Planner, and convening a public hearing, the Planning Board meets the criteria set forth in N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-5(d) and

(h) for redevelopment designation and recommended to the Mayor and Council that the delineated area be designated as a non-condemnation redevelopment area, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-1, et seq.; and

WHEREAS, at its regularly scheduled public meeting on July 21, 2020, on the basis of the Planning Board's recommendation and the Planner's investigative report and taking into account the public comments made, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus adopted Resolution No. 20-89 designating Block 1016, Lots 3, 5 and 11, commonly known as 619 North Maple Avenue, 217 First Street and 239 First Street, respectively, as a noncondemnation redevelopment area; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 20-90, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus directed the Planning Board to prepare a redevelopment plan for the designated Redevelopment Area, which was prepared and entitled "619 N. Maple Avenue, 217 & 239 First Street Redevelopment Plan" dated July 12, 2021 (the "Redevelopment Plan"); and

WHEREAS, the Planning Board, after having considered the aforementioned report and having held a public hearing, recommended that the Mayor and Council adopt the Redevelopment Plan; and

WHEREAS, by Ordinance dated August 24, 2021, the Borough adopted the Redevelopment Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council, via Resolution 21-100, on or about August 24, 2021, designated LMF HHK Urban Renewal LLC (the "URE") as the Redeveloper of the Redevelopment Area consistent with the Redevelopment Plan who proposes to construct 67 market rate residential rental units including 10 affordable rental units with related parking and onsite and offsite infrastructure improvements (hereinafter referred to as the "Project") within the **Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus** on a portion of the site described as Block 1016, Lots 3, 5 and 11 as shown on the Official Borough Tax Map of the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus, Bergen County, State of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, URE is an urban renewal entity, formed and qualified to do business under the provisions of the Long Term Tax Exemption Law, as amended and supplemented, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:20-1 et seq. (**the** "Long Term Tax Exemption Law"); and

WHEREAS, URE is the contract purchaser of owner of Block 1016, Lots 3, 5 and 11 (the "Property"); and WHEREAS, the Property is located in the Redevelopment Area, as required by the Long Term Tax Exemption Law, more specifically N.J.S.A. 40A:20-4; and

WHEREAS, URE has submitted an application on to the Borough for the approval of an urban renewal project, as such term is used in the Long Term Tax Exemption Law, all in accordance with the Long Term Tax Exemption Law, more specifically N.J.S.A. 40A:20-8 (the "Exemption Application"); and

WHEREAS, absent the tax incentives provided by the Long Term Tax Exemption Law, URE would likely not proceed with the Project; and

WHEREAS, Borough has determined after a detailed, critical evaluation, that the relative benefits of approving the Exemption Application outweigh the costs thereof and it is in the Borough's best interest;

WHEREAS, in order to enhance the economic viability of and opportunity for a successful project, the Borough will enter into an agreement (the "Financial Agreement") with URE, governing payments made to the Borough in lieu of real estate taxes on the Property pursuant to the Long Term Tax Exemption Law; and

WHEREAS, the Entity has agreed to make payment of the Annual Service Charge (as defined in the Financial Agreement) to the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor has submitted the Exemption Application and Financial Agreement to the Borough Council with her recommendation for approval (the "Mayor's Recommendation"); and

WHEREAS, the Council has determined that the Project represents an undertaking permitted by the Long Term Tax Exemption Law, and has further determined that the Project is an improvement made for the purposes of clearance, replanning, development, or redevelopment of an area in need of redevelopment within the Borough, as authorized by the Long Term Tax Exemption Law and finds that the Project shall promote and further the redevelopment of the Borough.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF HO-HO-KUS, NEW JERSEY AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Mayor in consultation with counsel to the Borough is hereby authorized to execute and/or amend, modify or make such necessary changes to the Exemption Application, the Financial Agreement and any other agreements necessary to effectuate the Financial Agreement.
- 2. An exemption from taxation as set forth in the Financial Agreement is hereby granted to URE, with respect to the Project on the Property for the term set forth in the Financial Agreement; provided that in no event shall the tax exemption exceed the earlier of (i) thirty-five (35) years from the date of execution of the Financial Agreement or (ii) to the extent permitted by N.J.S.A. 40A:20-13, thirty (30) years from URE's receipt of a Certificate of Occupancy and only so long as the Entity remains subject to

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and complies with the Financial Agreement and the Long Term Tax Exemption Law and any other agreement related to the Project or the Property.

- 3. The executed copy **of the** Financial Agreement shall be certified by and be filed with the Office of the Borough Clerk.
- 4. The Project shall conform with all Federal and State law and ordinances and regulations of the Borough relating to its construction and use.
- 5. The URE shall, in the operation of the Project, comply with all laws so that no person because of race, religious principles, color, national origin or ancestry, will be subject to discrimination.
- 6. The Entity shall, from the time the Annual Service Charge becomes effective, pay the Annual Service Charge as set forth in the Financial Agreement.
- 7. The following occurrences are express conditions to the grant of this tax exemption to be performed by the URE:
- (a) URE shall not, without prior consent of the Borough as set forth in the Financial Agreement, convey, mortgage or transfer all or any part of the Project which would sever, disconnect or divide the improvements being tax exempted under the Financial Agreement from the land underlying the exempted improvements.
- (b) URE shall complete the Project within the timeframes set forth in the Redevelopment Agreement between URE and the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus.
- 8. The Project will result in the redevelopment of the Borough by providing additional and improved residential development.
- 9. The Financial Agreement with URE is a necessary inducement to the undertaking of the Project.
- 10. A certified copy of this Ordinance and the Financial Agreement shall be transmitted by the Borough Clerk to the Director of the Division of Local Government Services, as required by N.J.S.A. 40A:20-12.
- 11. This Ordinance shall take effect after final passage and publication according to law.

STATEMENT

This Ordinance authorizes the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus to enter into a Financial Agreement for the Payment in Lieu of Taxes with LMF HHK Urban Renewal LLC.

A Resolution – Bond Anticipation Note, \$4,242,000

RESOLUTION OF THE BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF HO-HO-KUS, IN THE COUNTY OF BERGEN, NEW JERSEY, COVENANTING TO COMPLY WITH THE PROVISIONS OF THE INTERNAL REVENUE CODE OF 1986, AS AMENDED, APPLICABLE TO THE EXCLUSION FROM GROSS INCOME FOR FEDERAL INCOME TAX PURPOSES OF INTEREST ON OBLIGATIONS ISSUED BY THE BOROUGH OF HO-HO-KUS AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR, BOROUGH CLERK, CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER AND OTHER BOROUGH OFFICIALS TO TAKE SUCH ACTION AS THEY MAY DEEM NECESSARY OR ADVISABLE TO EFFECT SUCH COMPLIANCE AND DESIGNATING A \$4,242,000 BOND ANTICIPATION NOTE, DATED MAY 6, 2022 AND PAYABLE MAY 5, 2023, AS A "QUALIFIED TAX-EXEMPT OBLIGATION" PURSUANT TO SECTION 265(b)(3) OF THE INTERNAL REVENUE CODE OF 1986, AS AMENDED.

WHEREAS, the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus, in the County of Bergen, New Jersey (the "Borough") from time to time issues bonds, notes and other obligations, the interest on which is excluded from gross income for Federal income tax purposes, and desires to take such action as may be necessary or advisable to establish and maintain such exclusion; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), contains provisions with respect to the exclusion from gross income for Federal income tax purposes of interest on obligations, including provisions, among others, which require issuers of tax-exempt obligations, such as the Borough to account for and rebate certain arbitrage earnings to the United States Treasury and to take other action to establish and maintain such Federal tax exclusion; and

WHEREAS, the Borough intends to issue a \$4,242,000 bond anticipation note, dated May 6, 2022 and payable May 5, 2023 (the "Note"); and

WHEREAS, the Borough desires to designate the Note as a "qualified tax-exempt obligation" pursuant to Section 265(b)(3) of the Code;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus, in the County of Bergen, New Jersey, as follows:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. The Borough Council hereby covenants on behalf of the Borough, to the extent permitted by the Constitution and the laws of the State of New Jersey, to do and perform all acts and things permitted by law and necessary to assure that interest paid on bonds, notes or other obligations of the Borough (including the Note) be and remain excluded from gross income of the owners thereof for Federal income tax purposes pursuant to Section 103 of the Code.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. The Mayor, Borough Clerk, Chief Financial Officer and the other officials of the Borough are hereby authorized and directed to take such action, make such representations and give such assurances as they may deem necessary or advisable to effect compliance with the Code.

SECTION 3. The Note is hereby designated as a "qualified tax-exempt obligation" for the purpose of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code.

SECTION 4. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the Note is not a "private activity bond" as defined in the Code and (2) the Borough and its subordinate entities, if any, do not reasonably anticipate issuing in excess of \$10 million of new money tax-exempt obligations (other than private activity bonds) during the calendar year 2022.

<u>SECTION 5</u>. It is further determined and stated that the Borough has not, as of the date hereof, issued any tax-exempt obligations (other than the Note) during the calendar year 2022.

<u>SECTION 6</u>. The Borough will, to the best of its ability, attempt to comply with respect to the limitations on issuance of tax-exempt obligations pursuant to Section 265(b)(3) of the Code; however, said Borough does not covenant to do so, and hereby expressly states that a covenant is not made hereby.

SECTION 7. The issuing officers of the Borough are hereby authorized to deliver a certified copy of this resolution to the original purchaser of the Note and to further provide such original purchaser with a certificate of obligations issued during the calendar year 2022 dated as of the date of delivery of the Note.

SECTION 8. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Resolution #22-66

WHEREAS, the Fire Department of the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus, through its Acting Chief, has recommended to the Mayor and Council the appointments of member as follows; and

Resolution #22-67

A Resolution – Resolution calling for Review and Reform of OPRA

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Open Public Records Act (OPRA), N.J.S.A. 47:1A-1 et seq., enacted in 2002, has been in effect long enough to review the impact on Municipalities; and

WHEREAS, it is the position of the Bergen County League of Municipalities (BCLOM), which represents all 70 municipalities in Bergen County, that OPRA can and must be improved upon to make it less onerous on municipalities and protect the safety and welfare of the public; and

WHEREAS, municipal staff and budgets are increasingly utilized to accommodate the requestors and commercial entities who bombard municipalities with public records requests to the extent that in some instances, additional personnel are hired primarily to handle such requests; and

WHEREAS, municipalities are already required by state law to post and provide certain information and documentation on their municipal websites, including but not limited to, annual budgets, annual financial statements, annual audits, public meeting notices and meeting minutes; and

WHEREAS, under existing law, OPRA fees are woefully inadequate for the amount of time and effort needed to search for documents; it takes valuable time away from staff — not only in the Clerk's office — but also among other departments that may be involved in the same request; and

WHEREAS, OPRA has become broadly construed in favor of access and the requestor and, a requestor who prevails in any proceeding in appealing a denial of access is permitted to collect exorbitant attorney's fees; conversely, however, the resources and guidance available to record custodians and municipal counsel tasked with responding to such requests has narrowed drastically in the ever-changing OPRA arena, muddied by subsequent, voluminous and often-conflicting court decisions that contradict the original intent of the law and will continue to do so in the absence of necessary legislative reform; and

WHEREAS, OPRA law allows outside businesses, and activist groups to utilize municipal time and services for marketing leads or private commercial gain, and for litigants to use OPRA as a method of discovery; and WHEREAS, a clear distinction needs to be made between individual and commercial and discovery requests; and

WHEREAS, serious concerns about breaches or misuse of personal information exist along with the potential for OPRA to be exploited and abused by requestors, as a threat, harassment, or retaliatory measure to bury local governments in hundreds of requests, not necessarily because the requested records are of any particular interest, but merely because they can and have been emboldened by the courts to do so, to the significant detriment of all other municipal business; and

WHEREAS, most importantly, OPRA must be reformed to enable municipalities, their respective record custodians and legal counsels to protect the safety and welfare of the general public;

WHEREAS, over the years, court decisions have chipped away at the reasonable expectation of privacy provision of the law, thus allowing the law to be molded and wielded as a tool that severs any sensible balance of transparency, and instead, now perpetuates rampant and dangerous degrees of for-profit data-mining, unsolicited marketing and uncontrolled publications of records on internet search engines specifically designed to circumvent and bypass what few protective measures currently exist under OPRA, and all while allowing the requestor to remain cloaked in anonymity, should they choose to exercise that option; and

WHEREAS, the pandemic has resulted in a startling and exponential rise in fraud and identity theft, crimes that were already notoriously difficult to investigate, track and prosecute; OPRA, left unchecked and unreformed, continues to add fuel to this already dangerous fire; and

WHEREAS, in a most reprehensible instance in the midst of the pandemic, the unthinkable happened when the young son of a U.S. District Court Judge was senselessly killed by an individual who had managed to compile a dossier of personal information about the Judge including a home address, ushering in the passage of Daniel's Law: and

WHEREAS, while this law as intentioned provides for necessary strides and long overdue amendments to OPRA, the scope of protection provided is critically deficient, the implementation creates challenges for custodians and municipal officials that remain unaddressed by law, with limited channels for guidance, while the vast remainder of the Open Public Records Act continues to be left recklessly unreformed, potentially leaving any officials not covered under Daniel's Law or even, the general public at-large exposed to the whim of any nefarious OPRA requestor lurking in the shadows of those demanding transparency at any cost;

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill No. 4894, introduced January 17, 2019, calling for the creation of a study commission to review OPRA, to-date, has been left negligently stagnant and, to-date the legislative approach to addressing the dangers of OPRA have been fragmented, haphazard and contradictory at best, leading to a dire need for streamlined overhaul and reform, which, at a minimum should include the following:

• Immediate creation of a study commission on OPRA.

- Uniformity under the law: municipalities shall not be subject to any provision under OPRA that the legislature or other state agencies are, by contrast, exempt from.
- Provide a universal platform for clear and concise guidance for records custodians. Such guidance should be in place prior to any laws that impact OPRA going into effect.
- Require that official OPRA Request forms be used in order to be considered valid, including certifications by the requestor of (1) non-conviction of an indictable offense and (2) that information obtained will not be used for profit, solicitation, marketing or commercial gain, or published as part of a separate internet database or search engine.
- Prohibit OPRA requestors from remaining anonymous.
- Require that requestors provide a State of New Jersey address in order to be valid (OPRA should not apply to out-of-state requests).
- Prohibit requests for commercial purposes.
- Exempt email addresses (also serves as a deterrent to spoofing, phishing and other cyber scams and crimes).
- Exempt information maintained for emergency notification purposes.
- Exempt any information related to minor individuals, disabled persons and senior citizens as well as classes of citizens who are vulnerable to exploitation of their information.
- Exempt personal identifying information from Motor Vehicle Accident Reports, including driver's license numbers, dates of birth (DOBs), home addresses, VINs and registration/plate numbers, unless the requestor is a subject of the record, or their designated legal or insurance representative.
- Exempt pet license information to a need-to-know basis only (health department, police department, veterinarian of record, hospital, bite victim) to deter rising pet thefts and potential for targeted thefts of non-large-breed dog owners.
- Reaffirm exemption of unlisted telephone numbers, including personal cell phones.
- Exempt property owner names, CAMA Data and reaffirm the exemption of property record cards.
- Protections afforded under Daniel's Law should be afforded to all government officials, employees, volunteers and members of the general public as the threats from the disclosure of personal information is not unique to those rightfully protected under Daniel's Law.
- Provide a carve out for fee-shifting where a municipality in good faith and without clear guidance through Statute or case law denies a request or redacts information which could reasonably be interpreted as not subject to disclosure.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the BCLOM finds it imperative that the New Jersey Senate and Assembly review and reform the New Jersey Open Public Records Act.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution are sent to all New Jersey State Legislators, the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, the New Jersey Municipal Clerks' Association, the Bergen County Municipal Clerks' Association, the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police and the Bergen County Police Chiefs' Association.

LIAISON REPORTS

<u>Recreation</u> – Councilman Iannelli reported fall sports is still open for registration. The planning for HHK Day is well underway. They have begun their messaging campaign today. They will be putting out information through social media and getting flyers out shortly. We are in the process of getting food truck secured and the logistically layout should be done in the next couple of weeks.

<u>Library</u> – Councilman Policastro reported in the month of April circulation totaled 3028, this is 1% higher than March and 11% lower than 2021. Library ran 17 events in April with a total participation of 109. DPW inspected the library leaky area in the ceiling following the last couple of rain storms, which appears to be rotting. DPW added two additional tarps to the roofs to manage these spots which have been effective so far. The new circulation position is going to be filled soon. Lastly, the Board of Trustee is working on a revised set of by-laws.

<u>Board of Education</u> – Councilman Policastro reported during the first week in May a bear took up residence in a tree on the school grounds. The Police Department had control over the situation. The HHK Education Foundation held a fundraiser event on May 6th Sanzari's New Bridge Inn. The HSA had their County Fair on May 13th and was a big success.

Ambulance Corp. – Councilman Crossley reported they had meeting last night. All the driver's that took the CEVO class all passed. Councilman discussed; the Ambulance Corp. is looking into joining the Yellow Dot Program, which is an emergency medical program in which participants paste a Yellow Dot decal on the rear windshield or bumper of their vehicle. This Yellow Dot indicates that essential emergency medical information of the participant (their emergency contacts, current medications, medical issues, tec) is in their glove compartment. Therefore, in the case of a car accident in which the participant may be unresponsive, first responders have easy access to crucial medical information. More details to follow.

<u>Fire Department</u> - Councilman Shell reported, he was away on business so he cannot attend the meeting. However, they have been responding to many calls. He thanked them for their service. Councilman Iannelli added they are doing some training tonight 115 & 119 first street as these two structures are going to be torn down.

<u>Chamber of Commerce</u> – Councilman shell report the new administration at the Chamber is drawing a nice crowd at their meeting. The Chamber is very engaged in HHK Day.

<u>Police</u> - Captain Mc Bain reported they had to two attempted car burglaries and was successful. Since the Attorney General changed the guidelines where we can know pursue the number had decreased in the state. We are in our final stages of our creditations. The incident on May 12 on Lakewood Avenue ended peacefully

and he is getting the help he needs.

<u>Beautification Committee</u> - Council Crossley reported they had their first meeting last week. They took a field trip to scope the grounds to discuss the work that needs to be done. Our focus right now is on the Town Green, Memorial Park and Sycamore. Looking to get this done by the end of the summer.

<u>CLOSED SESSION</u> - On a motion by Councilman Crossley, seconded by Councilwoman Moran, the Mayor and Council approved entering into Executive Session closed to the public. Motion Carried by voice vote – all present voting "Aye".
