2019 Budget Overview

Municipal Budget – The proposed budget increased 7.8% over the 2018 level. This primarily reflects increases in capital projects, salaries and wages and pension costs.

Municipal Tax Rate – The proposed tax rate reflects no change from 2018 primarily resulting from the utilization of budget surplus.

Borough Debt Levels – The previously outstanding debt of \$5.4 million was paid off and replaced by new debt of \$5.7 million with an interest rate of 2.3%. The debt principal will be paid back in installments starting in 2020 and ending in 2029.

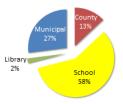
Capital Investment – The 2019 budget will provide \$800,000 of capital projects including road resurfacing, vehicle purchases and other infrastructure improvements.

Surplus Status – There was a budget surplus balance of \$3.5 million at the end of 2018, of which \$700,000 is being used to offset the tax rate.

Budget - Discussion Points

- Capital Improvements —There is \$800,000 included in the proposed budget for funding capital projects.
 - Road Resurfacing We anticipate investing approximately \$500,000 for road resurfacing, some of which will be ultimately funded through various grants.
 - Other Projects These include the purchase of a new DPW vehicle as well as radio and recording system upgrades for the Police, Fire and DPW Departments.
- Statutory Pension Expenditures State mandated pension payments for the PERS (non-police officer employees) and PFRS (Police Officers) total \$703,622, an increase of 7.7% from 2018.
- Sick Leave Payouts The Borough negotiated to reduce compensation for unused accumulated sick leave in our labor agreements going forward. Employees would receive an early reduced payout over a several year period for previously accrued sick time. The potential cost of these accelerated payouts are included in the sick leave trust account.
- Debt The budget includes approximately \$820,000 of debt service. The first principal payment of \$350,000 on the newly acquired bond will be made in 2020.

Borough property taxes have four components with the Municipal Services portion comprising 27% of the total property tax bill.

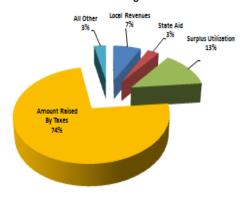
